Commitment Sunday

St Peter's

Reading: John 6:41-51

I was really amused by a young boy who came to church with his family. They didn't usually come. At the time of collection he put in the plate a 50 cent coin given to him by his dad. Then at communion he was the only one in his family to go up. When asked why he went up, he said, "Well, I'd paid for it!"

Today is our annual commitment Sunday. The Sunday when we are asked to recommit ourselves to serving God in the world, in our families and at Church. We are also asked to recommit our financial giving to the church.

Jesus in the Gospel is offering himself as bread for the world. He is committing himself to be lifegiving food. We can say his words are fulfilled in the Holy Communion, as we receive him, but they are also fulfilled as we become the body of Christ in the world. We are transformed by the bread of life to become life for the world.

So a question for our commitment Sunday would be something like this: how are we giving of ourselves to be the life of the world? Not just our 50 cents, but all of our lives.

Normally at this point in the commitment sermon the vicar outlines how much we desperately need your giving and how vital it is to maintain the church. All true, but this year I thought I'd ask a few people to tell us what ways they are being fed by the church. I have divided the answers into worship, pastoral care and the outreach of our church. These are some of the answers I got.

Firstly worship

St Peter's Upper Riccarton and Yaldhurst offers a number of different styles of worship that provides services for all, whether it be a quiet contemplative Eucharist, a traditional Choral Eucharist, an all-age contemporary service, a Mandarin Service or a mid-week more intimate Eucharist.

I prefer the quiet, calm Wednesday Service where, in a warm friendly atmosphere, I can concentrate on the readings, prayers and sermon in a more intimate setting. Don't get me wrong, I also enjoy the hymns, music/choir and busyness of other services too, but I am a traditionalist and my worship "style" is the 'old school' that I was brought up with alongside my family, since I was born.

In our magnificently restored church, which contains so much history, I find the ideal atmosphere to worship our Heavenly Father, no matter which service I attend. I have been a member of St Peter's for over 58 years (since I married Tony) and value not only the very reverent opportunity to come together with others (who have become my caring valued

friends) but to also learn from the down-to-earth, informative and often thought-provoking sermons from the clergy.

My four daughters were baptized here, were married here and my 14 grandchildren baptized in this hallowed place. A number of my relatives have been farewelled here too, so St Peter's is very much our family's church.

Outreach

A digital prayer request came in:

"I am in an abusive relationship and trying to leave but the last few months I have also been very sick ... in hospital 4x ... just out now, 2 days. Surgeries, infections etc. I have no family and no friends ... been isolated. I want a small home that is safe and peaceful where my pets and I can live. The odds are so against me ... not enough money ... I lack courage too. Please pray for me. I know God can make a way. I can't go through another Christmas like last year ... spent crying my eyes out. I am still so sick and my health is fragile. Please just pray for me. I need hope ... I am traumatized and fearful of living in a women's refuge" Anon

A response to a Podcast clip which talked about a personal past struggle of not feeling God's presence: "My Church trauma is exactly that. Made me feel like God never picked up my call for help. Until I joined a small local Youth Camp and they unlocked my childhood trauma. It turns out I needed to forgive my past to be able to live in the present with God properly. I felt His warmth that night and was able to reconcile with my own father as well. What I learnt? With Him, there is always a way." Anon
