

We are blessed to have her, almost totally paid for by the Diocese. To the Wardens; my Warden Dr. Corin Murfitt, he is the best warden I have ever had, and I've had a few! He brings huge dedication and much ability. To Jo Winfield, as people's warden. Jo works like a Trojan in so many different ways. Thank you Jo.

My thanks too, to Pamela O'Brien who has worked with dedicated service over 26 years, as the Parish Administrator, and who recently handed in her resignation. I know we will miss her in this ministry and we wish her a wonderful retirement. Shyuan has been employed as the Parish Administrator and we wish her joy in her new position. To Haydn Hill our able Music Director, thank you for all the excellent music of the choir in particular, they really lift our worship.

To Ethan Wilson-Bruce our youth leader, orchestra leader, and verger. Many times I have relied on Ethan throughout the year, and

he never lets me down. The orchestra is outstanding, as is his work with young people.

To Jason Olley who works in the grounds, he takes a real pride in his work. Kathy Doughty works as a volunteer to put together awesome worship, I am so grateful to her. Among the varied and innovative worship offered in 2018, a highlight was the confirmation service.

There are too many to thank, so if I miss you it doesn't mean I don't love you! But one more change is that Leigh Craythorne stood down after 17 years as rest home coordinator and has handed the baton to Sue Robb who now coordinates our ministry to 7 rest homes. Another volunteer. Thanks Sue.

Thanks also to the Vestry which carries the vision of the Parish. It was good to have a recent quiet afternoon to set the theme for the coming year. The theme; "passing the baton," is very much in line with what our new Bishop is tasking himself with. My limited experience of relay racing is that it's good to run hard and fast, but we need to hand over to the next runner. For many of us in our different ministries, we need to ask the question, "who am I going to hand over to?" If the answer is, there isn't anyone, we need to ask God in prayer to help us identify that person. This is a challenge that Vestry wants to work with us all on in the coming year.

I'm also grateful for your understanding when I need to do my Archdeacon duties. I can't think of a time when this ministry has been to the detriment of the Parish, but it sure helps to know you are supporting me as I support the 7 Parishes in this area. I have dropped a committee; the Sister Eveleen Retreat House committee, to try and lighten my workload, and I'm pleased to say this retreat house is up and running (so they don't need me anyway!)

I'm very excited about the coming year. It will be a challenge to accommodate more people on site, as the Preschool grows and it will be such a joy to be able to worship in an even better St Peter.

Assistant Priest's Report

FAMILY SERVICE

The family service continues to draw good numbers with an average of about 60 people attending most months.

The aim of this service is to introduce our children, and young people to Anglican liturgical worship; and for them to take an active role in the service - playing the music, leading the worship, praying and reading. It is a delight to see their enjoyment in doing this. We also have a couple of songs for the little kids to sing.

Overall, this is an enjoyable time where families can connect with each other and our Anglican heritage.

THE FAMILY ORCHESTRA

The Youth orchestra was renamed the St Peter's Family Orchestra to reflect the makeup of the group - youth and the not so youth. This group has become quite accomplished at playing not only modern church tunes but also those that draw on our Anglican past.

Through the year, they have performed at my induction in Lyttelton and played for the Lyttelton Carol service, with one person remarking "That was the best carol service I have ever been to."

Wonderful to see how this group has developed.

New Songs

Each month we have been introducing a new song to our worship. This was a result of the request of a number, both young and older, wanting to sing something new.

The songs selected are ones that we also sing at the Family service; and are drawn from those composers who write music to fit Anglican and liturgical worship.

HEALING SERVICE

This is a service held quarterly and allows us to sit quietly and reflectively; allowing God to minister to us with his healing love.

GENERAL PRIESTLY DUTIES

I continue to enjoy carrying out my priestly duties of preaching, celebrating at the Eucharist, taking weddings and funerals.

Overall, another happy and rewarding year at St Peter's and St Luke's.

Warden's Report

Who said Anglicans never, or cannot, change? This last Parish year we have seen several changes. To our worship, staff, and buildings.

CLERGY & SERVICES

Our vicar Ven. Nick Mountfort is now well settled into our Parish and together with the Ministry Team has made some small changes to our worship. The singing of a Psalm between the Readings and new hymns are examples of these changes. We usually have the new hymn for about one month to learn it. There is no fear that the traditional Anglican service that our parish is known for will change.

Beginning December 2018 Revd John McLister was appointed to a 20% position as Vicar of Lyttelton. John is employed by our Parish for the remaining 80% but contributes more than that to our Parish life. The family service is still his baby but has weaned into a very popular service that is well attended. You are encouraged to attend one of these services that are held on the fourth Sunday of each month.

The Family Orchestra (once called Youth Orchestra) still lohn and Ethan's is responsibility. This orchestra is well recognized within the Diocese and plays at special services in Lyttelton. It is important for this orchestra to know that it is appreciated by the Parish and it would be great to see it have a role in more of our regular services at St Peter's, or even St Luke's. This orchestra plays at all the Family Services and is well received.

Revd Kofe Havea joined our Parish at the beginning of 2019 after being the first Tongan to be ordained in our diaconate on Ist December 2018. Kofe came to us from St John's College. However, she had worshipped at St Barnabas with her husband, Leni, for some time and had had several lay roles there. Pastoral care is a passion for her. Kofe is a 50% appointment and because of the contribution from the Curates' Fund this position is not costing us.

We thank the clergy for their devotion to spreading the gospel and their pastoral care. Without their supportive spouses this could not happen so thanks are extended to Rosemary, Yaeko and Leni.

LAY STAFF

Several folks serve the Parish and God in so many ways. So many that we can forget to mention or thank some.

Ethan is almost 'the Jack of all trades' in our family – musician, youth ministry, Verger, IT

assistant and 'Master of them ALL.' Ethan and two of his colleagues are now residing at 27 Yaldhurst Rd –a Christian flat!

Yaeko keeps our entire Hall complex clean and does this in a very diligent way. Jason is our part—time ground person and succeeds in keeping them tidy. The lawns are mown by a contractor and although this is the better option they are not kept as manicured as when we used our own mower. There is a large amount of grass to mow and in spring and autumn it can be difficult to keep the grounds as we would wish. Dennys Guild is Jason's guiding light.

Kathy Doughty has, as we now expect from her, been remarkable in her arrangement of services with Haydn and the clergy. One wonders how long Kathy can continue to provide this quite unique ministry that is time consuming.

Haydn thankfully after 25 years still serves as our Musical Director and tutors the choir that is without doubt the best choir in the Diocese. The effort choir members and musicians devote to our Parish is exemplary. There is a school of thought that we do need to change our music style a little without throwing the 'quaver out with the semibreve.' I know Haydn awaits the return of the Rieger!

Adeline is now the Editor of Gateway and is doing an outstanding job. Thanks for this important communicative tool that you have developed in a new way.

Marilyn Dempster is a stalwart of the Parish and has served in many ways. As age creeps up Marilyn has reduced the services that she offered but is still always there when needed.

Leigh Craythorne during the year resigned as facilitator for the Rest Home services. What a sterling job she has done. Sue Robb now has this vital position as her responsibility.

To those who sing in the choir, play a musical instrument, serve in the kitchen, make Palm crosses, help in Garage and Plant sales, are members of the A Team, including Brian Anthony our 'fix-it' man we offer a huge thanks.

Without these people we couldn't survive as a Parish. We need the Garage & Plant sales for financial assistance so thanks to the organizers of these; Dennys, Gwen, Bobbity, Jill and Jan.

Bruce Williams is sort of resigning as Parish Treasurer. He will stand for Vestry this meeting but the accounts will now be the responsibility of the Diocese through the Parish Accounting Scheme. We pay for this but now Bruce has retired from accounting practice it is unfair to ask him to do all the work he has done for decades. Bruce, you need a medal!

Pamela O'Brien has served this Parish for 26 years and a few weeks prior to this AGM resigned from her position as Parish Administrator. Pamela has given truly faithful service during this time and the place will not be the same without her!

With the preschool opening in the second term of 2019 it was decided by the Vicar and Wardens that we should trial for 6 months a joint position of Administrator for the Parish and Preschool.

This will save the Parish some money particularly in terms of reduced hours and sharing of office equipment. More importantly it will give added 'ownership' and association of the preschool with this Parish.

Pamela worked 30 hours per week but this will reduce to 22.5 hours with Preschool employing the Administrator another 22.5 hours. The Administrator will be responsible to Manukau Community Christian Trust and the Vicar and Wardens of this Parish.

However, the Administrator will be paid by MCC Trust and we will be billed for 50% of the salary and a share of the use of equipment. The Administrator will be based at the preschool.

We believe this is worth a trial and will evaluate the feasibility of it in 6 months and act accordingly.

VESTRY

To those who served on Vestry but are not seeking re-election thank you. Vestry is a commitment and it would be appreciated that if you know in advance that you are unable to attend a significant number of meetings or the Vestry Quiet Day that you reconsider whether you wish to stand.

Denise Gullery is our Vestry Secretary and hosts the meetings at her home. Her position is as recorder of the Minutes and has no voting rights but can speak on invitation. We really appreciate her dedication to this, often, unenviable task.

Vestry is the powerhouse of the Parish and if you feel your talents might be of some use please put your name forward. We always need someone to pass the baton to.

EXCITING TIMES

How exciting is it that 2019 will see the opening of the St Peter's Anglican Pre-school and our beloved church will hopefully re-open in August 2020? We still need to raise more funds for this rebuild but once the community sees some action we hope they will generously give. Fundraising, regrettably, for the church has been in competition with our giving to Parish funds.

We acknowledge ALL who give in many ways and for being part of our Parish family. THANK YOU.

Maintenance:



Mission

The Mission Committee members are Jean Anthony and Irene and Peter Coman. We appreciate the support of many parishioners with baking, jam, produce, preserves and condiments. The Mission table was started in the late 1980's and had very small beginnings. The stalls were held in the foyer of the church and raised about \$40 per month. Rest Home and Home Communion Ministry

This year, St Peter's and St Luke's have continued to provide ministry to eight rest homes. We also share Holy Communion in private homes with those parishioners who are unable to come to services.



Clergy or lay ministers, assisted by helpers including pianists, share the Eucharist once a month with residents of the rest homes. Residents look forward to these services, and in some cases they invite members of their families to come along and share Communion with them. As well as celebrating Communion, we spend time talking with the residents in order to get to know them better.

In the first year I have been coordinating the rest home ministry, the number of communicants appears to remain steady, although in a few rest homes the numbers are increasing. The number of residents attending rest home communions also appears to vary

with respect to the involvement of the activities coordinator.

Each week, rest home services are noted in our parish bulletin. The rest homes to be visited during the following week are prayed for, and the sacrament blessed, ready to take to the service. Once again, at Christmas 2018, St Peter's choir sang well-known carols at many rest homes, which was much appreciated by the rest home staff and residents.

A second team, as far as is possible in pairs, take Holy Communion to people in their own homes, once a month or at a time to suit. Both teams find that the Ministry is a privilege. To share the celebration of the Eucharist, and to meet the special pastoral needs of the extended community in residential care and in private homes, is very special.

I concluded my report to last year's AGM with the hope of "making my final report at the 2019 AGM and signing off." Unfortunately, that is not as yet the case and we still have a shortfall in reaching our goal of approximately \$2.5 million. This is something in the vicinity of \$400,000 but we remain very confident of reaching this sum before St. Peter's opens its doors once again. Significantly a Special Meeting of Parishioners agreed at the end of last year that Church Property Trustees could hold \$500,000 of the parish glebe funds for the task of restoration. As this would not be allocated to the contractor until near the end of the rebuild we are hopeful that it will not

need to be drawn down because our fundraising will have achieved its target. We are confident that the encouraging sight of the work commencing will bring other donors on board.

A year ago we still retained the services of Barrer and Co providing their professional expertise in fundraising however with the end in sight we did not renew their contract beyond September. We nevertheless owe them a great deal of gratitude for all that they achieved on our behalf and with the close relationship that we had created with them we were sorry to terminate that arrangement. They still retain a very real interest in how we are progressing such was their commitment to our project.



Applications have continued to trusts and charities with varying levels of success. The same could be said of our approaches to St. nationally Peter's churches and now internationally. We are inviting parishioners to identify other churches that we might approach and that they have some point of contact with. Major gifts from generous individuals have been forthcoming while our Living Stones and Blocks scheme still receives gifts of \$1000 or \$500 regularly. The Living Bequest programme has allowed others to participate either in weekly payments or with a one-off donation of \$6,500.

Other events through the year have included an evening with Archbishop David Moxon, quiz nights, a Christmas raffle, and proceeds from the annual book sale. The latter three will be repeated over the course of this year along with a High Tea including entertainment and with a major ball being planned for 2020. Still in mind is an organ recital in the Transitional Cathedral and a variety concert with some noted performers.

The staff at Church Property Trustees: Suzanne, Jackie, Morag, and now Kerryn, have been of very great assistance particularly taking over some of the processes previously seen to by Barrers.

Once again I must acknowledge those who have been at the heart of the operation through our committee - Vicar Nick, Treasurer Bruce, Corin Murfitt, Paul Rhodes, Bob Shearing, Fiona Gilmore and Jo Winfield.

As has been said elsewhere - "We can do this."

Worship in 2018

We continue to worship in the parish hall and, although there have been delays in getting started, the church rebuild will begin in earnest in 2019.

Services continue at 8am and 9.30am on Sundays and at 10am on Wednesdays. Family services were held at I am on the fourth Sunday of each month and have been very successful. Occasional healing services were held. We continue to use all the Communion liturgies in A New Zealand Prayer Book – He Karakia Mihinare o Aotearoa. In 2018 John McLister prepared services for each seasons of the Church's year - Epiphany, Lent, the Easter season and Ordinary Time. The services now include a psalm, said at 8am and sung at 9.30am. A sung gospel acclamation has also been introduced to services as well as well as a Song of Praise and some responses from the English Folk Song Mass. A new hymn from the hymns sung at Family Services is introduced each month. I still prepare the service sheets for clergy, the information sheet for the choir and the two services for the data projector each week.

The young people in our congregation help at 9.30 services as servers, data projector and sound system operators. They all take a major part in the monthly Family Services. Our teenagers continued looking after the younger children and their efficiency and dedication is a joy to see. Their interviews, filmed and put together by Ethan, about what Christmas means for them were refreshing.

The institution of a 'youth' orchestra has provided opportunities for young people to take part in 9.30am services in a fresh way as well as playing at family services. Older people have been added to their numbers and it is good to see different age groups working together. This orchestra will become the Family Orchestra in 2019

The now traditional services were held in 2018 for the Nurse Maude Association and the Canterbury Jockey Club. Ash Wednesday was celebrated at the 10am service and, with Upper Riccarton Methodists, we joined worshippers at an evening service at Our Lady of Victories. We welcomed Bishop David to our patronal festival for a service of confirmation and renewal. We welcomed the Methodists to either St Peter's or St Luke's in September for the annual Spring Service. Christmas and Easter were celebrated with special services and there were special services for Candlemas and All Saints Sunday.
