

We often meet up with the two Sisters from Ashburton for our Community meeting or to celebrate someone's birthday. We celebrated Sr. Annette's 91st birthday with a lovely meal of fish and chips, which is her favourite. We continue to give thanks to God for their lives.

Work and Mission in Fiji and Tonga continue and we thank God each day for their lives. Our two Novices are doing well and helping in parishes, and one of them, Novice Malia is studying at the Tonga Institute. Please continue to pray and remember our two Novices in their training and especially Novice Melania as she prepare for her Profession in Simple Vows.

Thank you for all your love, prayer and support for the Community.

Reflection from the Warden

A year ago, we all met at the CSN central city site, to honour its history, and to farewell it. It was an emotional time, attended by the sisters, the Community supporters and by people who had served the CSN as Chaplains, wardens, finance committee members, and in other capacities. All of us are struck by the implications of change. The Community itself had experience major changes. I invite us all to reflect on the identity and calling of the Community of the Sacred Name, as its NZ members and supporters meet to take stock of all those changes, and to steer their cances into the ocean of the future.

The sisters' ministries were founded on the love of God, on a deep reverence for scripture, and on the disciplines and practices of a devout religious community. There is a "but" in all this. But...in New Zealand, religious communities have all tailed away, unable to renew their membership by recruiting new people to join. This is, in part, connected to our Church's willingness to train and ordain women, and encourage them to become priests, deacons, bishops, wardens, and in general, members of the church's hierarchy. It is also due to massive social changes, that have enabled women to be fully recognised, empowered, and be recognised as equal to men. I realise that there is more progress to be made in this respect. The end result is that religious communities have diminished in membership and influence. In 1988, the CSN had at least 18 members, spread between three countries. Now, there are eight. New members maybe few and aging. The ministries they can offer have greatly reduced. These changes can be seen as today, in Halswell, and no longer in the central city premises in Barbadoes and Tuam Streets. As you'll know, the Community decided to put that site up for sale.

After some debates and different expressions of interest from various parties, the CSN site is being purchased by the Methodist Central Mission. The sale will be concluded on August 28. The site will enable them to offer shelter and practical help to some of the city's more vulnerable people, and to provide themselves with an administration centre. I know that this agreement is highly satisfactory for the sisters, and for the Finance Committee, who have handled the transactions and spent much time debating the issues. It is a pleasing arrangement, because it will enable the site to be used for purposes very similar to those for which it was established. It is also a practical expression of the good relationships that have grown between the Anglican and Methodist Churches. I am sure that the sisters will ensure that the Methodists are aware off the history and spirituality of the complex, and therefore, of the ministries and traditions that have shaped the use of the site.

What will continue is the Community's life of devotion and outreach. It has left behind its mulberries and roses, its trillium flowers and apples, pears, apricot and plums; but a new cycle of growth and manifestation of beauty has taken root in this property. It will continue to be a place of worship and devotion, of prayer and service. Here, it is a scared place for those who follow Jesus, by denying themselves, taking up their cross daily, and following him.
